From the Director's Desk

The year 2020-21 was the global pandemic year. From March 2020 onwards, the tentacles of Corona virus began spreading in India. The unseen virus disrupted the human life and everything came to a screeching halt. A kind of uncertainty and despair prevailed with Covid spreading like wild fire. The complete lockdown was announced across the nation. At a time when millions of people and vulnerable communities were struggling without food and money on one hand and the fear of contracting the virus on the other, the existing medical support systems were over stretched and creaked under the non-stop invasion of Corona virus. We received distress calls from migrant communities to which we promptly responded and also mobilised the resources to help people. Our first response was to reach people with food and dry rations. Being in lockdown, the procurement of food items was very difficult but we managed to prepare and deliver ration kits for the families stranded at home



during the extended lock-downs, loss of livelihood and restrictions of movement. Our Corona Warriors, the Child Line Greater Noida team rushed with food, rations and milk for the children.

Hats off to our team, who ensured that none had to sleep without food. The Covid relief work had continued over the entire year. We distributed over 5500 grocery kits besides 6000 bottles of safe drinking water, 33214 face masks, 10282 Dettol soaps and 10 liters of hand sanitizer. We reached over to 22000+ adults and children residing in migrant communities of Noida, Greater Noida, Dadri, Bisrakh, Gurugram and Delhi. Besides taking food to families, we reached out to 580 children in distressed situations such as physical, mental, emotional and sexual abuse during the lockdown. As it is, the lack of resources such as digital tools at home, was taking a heavy toll on these children. The existing Digital Gap had deprived the youth and children of online opportunities of learning. Our Digital Bank initiative in partnership with One Teacher One Scientist, provided mobile phones, laptops, and digital cameras to children and youth for inclusive online learning.

We spent the entire year catering for the needs and requirements of vulnerable communities so that they could face the crises of life due to Covid. We changed our working strategy to adjust to the New Normal pronounced by Covid. Our fight against Covid continues for Right to food, Zero Hunger, Right to Child Protection and Online skill training of the youth.

We thank our partners to support our Fight against Covid and protecting the vulnerable from the crises of life. It is the spirit of resilience and positivism which had helped us sail through the year and serve the communities in the unprecedented times of Covid-19.

ABOUT THE ORGANIZATION

Social and Development Action and Research Group (SADRAG) is a not-for-profit organization, which was established in the year 2004. SADRAG works primarily in Delhi and in the state of U.P. and Haryana. It commenced its operation in southern India in 2012, when it launched an initiative to educate migrant children in peri-urban communities of Bengaluru in Karnataka.

SADRAG envisions Inclusive Communities where people are educated, safe and have access to decent livelihood opportunities. It advocates for extensive research combined with community action as a solution for bringing about an equalitarian and qualitative change in the communities. The organization empowers women, children and youth through training, capacity building and service delivery for their basic needs for education, health, skill development and livelihood.

The organization follows the Grassroots Implementation Model in convergence with stakeholders from different backgrounds and disciplines. The organization has a deep-rooted presence in the community and continues to maintain the trust and partnerships built therein.

The success of SADRAG is based on the scale of qualitative change brought about in human life through direct intervention, training and research.

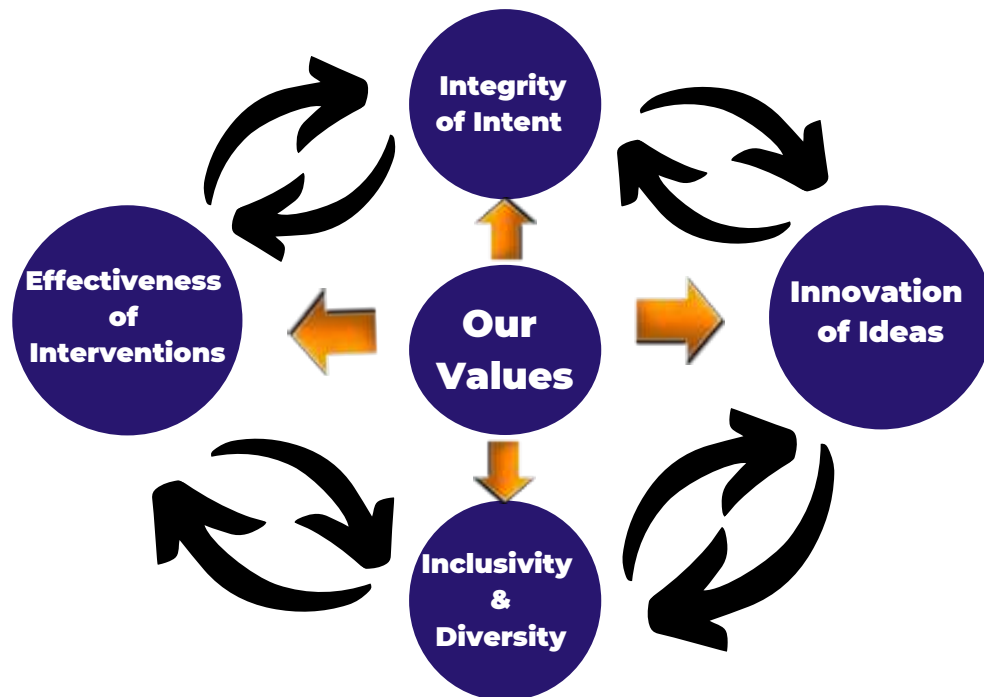
Capacity building of women, children and youth by meeting their basic education, health, skill development and livelihood skills.

OUR VALUES

SADRAG works on certain intrinsic values. These values constitute the core of the organization's existence.

THE OBJECTIVES

- Our Objectives reflect the collective strategy of research, training and direct action to bring about a qualitative change in the life of vulnerable communities.
- Action research and praxis in development issues across economic and socio-cultural variables in rural and urban areas.
- Study the socio-cultural construct of 'Gender' as prevalent and practised in our society.
- Dissemination and sharing of research findings among stakeholders, policy makers, academicians and social activists.
- Implementation of learnings drawn from action research to improve the quality of life of community youth, children and women.
- Working in the area of Child Welfare/Child Development/ Child Protection and Child Rights in rural and urban areas.



PROGRAMMES AND INITIATIVES

We primarily work in the following thematic areas:

- **Education:** The program advocates for child rights to healthy and safe childhood, protection from abuse and formal school education. The interventions include the following programmes: -

Ugta Suraj is the program to mainstream the Out of School children and to ensure that no child is deprived of his/her basic right to education that has been granted under the Right to Education Act, 2009.

Vidya Ratna is a full scholarship awarded to migrant children who may otherwise be deprived of formal school education due to economic constraints or systemic challenges.

Life Skills Education is the program to empower adolescent youth through life skills education and learn a balanced way of life.

Strengthening the Government School System strengthens and enriches the government schools by improving infrastructural and qualitative resources for improved learning levels among the children.

- **Protection from Abuse & Violence:** We work for protection of children, young girls and women through research, training and direct intervention in specific instances of abuse and violence. In partnership with Child Line India Foundation, we support and rescue the children from distressed situations through 1098, the 24 hours National Phone Helpline under the ICPS scheme of the Central Government.

Our Safe City initiative is to build 'Zero tolerance to Violence against Women and young Girls' in private and public spaces. By educating women and young girls, stake-holders sensitisation, safety audits and use of mobile phone technology, the program advocates for safe spaces and a gender sensitized ecosystem. Institutionalised training on POSH is conducted for we advocate for diverse, inclusive and gender sensitive workplaces. We are a part of the institutional mechanism for POSH at various organisations where we conduct gender sensitisation trainings and address the ICC complaints.

- **Skill Development and Livelihood:** Through training in skill development, we work for women and youth through Self Help Groups (SHGs), direct job placement economical enterprise in rural and urban areas. We provide skill training through periodical courses which have technical as well as non-technical training such as career guidance, soft skills, financial literacy etc.
- **Community Development:** We work in rural and urban communities to create facilities and provide services in the area of literacy, health and livelihood that are meant to improve the quality of life of local people.
- **Action Research & Training:** We conduct research on socially relevant issue such as child labour, child protection, literacy & education, violence against women, gender and livelihood. These are learning opportunities to generate knowledge for planning, implementation and monitoring of various programs initiated by us. Our training programs span over The SH Act 2013, issues of Child Protection, gender sensitization and Gender Inclusive workplaces.

Ugta Suraj for a Literate Childhood

Ugta Suraj is the program to mainstream "out of school" children. The program has been operational in Noida since August 2007. With firm roots in the community, Ugta Suraj operates through a Network of Learning and Support Centers (LSCs) for children who are working/non-working, migrant/ street or are the potential child workers. These children are either school drop-outs or are the first-generation learners who have been deprived of formal schooling due to family or systemic reasons. Ugta Suraj is essentially meant for children in the age group 6 to 14 years. It is essentially a bridge between the formal school system and the community. It prepares children for formal schooling and assists them in school enrollment in government, private or charitable schools.

Ugta Suraj aims to disrupt the deprived ways of life by providing an alternate opportunity of learning to children through:

- **Preparation for formal school system.**
- **Empowerment through life skills education.**
- **Orientation on values of leadership, Gender Sensitization & Citizenship.**

Ugta Suraj centers are presently, functional in 3 communities: Village Nithari, Village Nagla Charandas in Noida and in Village Tugalpur in Greater Noida. These centers have children from migrant communities. While the parents struggle for livelihood, the children remain deprived of formal school education.

Ugta Suraj session, 2020-21, was planned to begin in April 2020. However, the global pandemic of Covid-19 had hit the Indian shores in March 2020. The nation came to a standstill with the announcement of national lockdown by the central government. The entire focus shifted to children's safety and the centers were completely closed. Ugta Suraj centers were closed till early September 2020.

By September 2020, the cases of Covid had been reduced and we were fully adapted to the New Normal. In third week of September 2020, a batch of 10 children was enrolled in each center with a strict adherence to Covid prevention guidelines that included use of face mask, hand sanitizer and maintaining a minimum distance of 2 meters from each other.

From September 2020 onwards, Ugta Suraj children were introduced to S.L.A.T.E. curriculum (Simple Learning Activities to Think and Empower). S.L.A.T.E. has been conceptualized and developed by Vaishali Gupta, an Educationist and Founder of One Teacher One Scientist. The aim is to provide the experience of experiential learning to children from disadvantaged communities.

In the year 2020, Covid had disrupted the regular cycle of mobilization, enrolment and mainstreaming of Ugta Suraj children. The children from Ugta Suraj session: 2019-20 could not be mainstreamed for the formal school session of 2020-21 since the schools were closed in March 2020 due to Covid. The schools were taking the online classes but the children, neither had digital tools nor they could follow online learning.

• **Experiential Learning for Ugta Suraj:**

On 8 September 2020, the International Literacy Day, SLATE program was introduced to Ugta Suraj children. We had partnered with One Teacher: One Scientist to restructure and innovate the learning curriculum for Ugta Suraj children. SLATE, an integrated & innovative curriculum was tailor made for Ugta Suraj children.

An orientation session was held by Vaishali Gupta, Founder, One Teacher: One Scientist on the launch day of SLATE. The Ugta Suraj facilitators from Nagla, Nithari and Tughalpur centers, participated in the online session.

Vidya Ratan

Vidya Ratna is the school scholarship program for children from migrant communities. The programme was launched in 2008 for the support of formal school education of Ugta Suraj children till the completion of higher secondary school.

The Vidya Ratna children have been enrolled in Noida Public Senior Secondary School, Noida since Class II. We provide the year-round support for school fees, uniform, text books and stationary requirements to all the children.

In 2020, thirteen Vidya Ratna children continued their school journey with Noida Public Senior Secondary School. Out of the thirteen children, four children were the students of Class XII and were due to appear for the CBSE board examination. Of the remaining children, four were in Class X and two were in Class IX.

During the year 2020, Covid impacted school studies a lot. The schools were physically closed and the teachers restored to online teaching. However, the children suffered due to the inadequacies and inequities of the formal education system. The major challenge was an in access to digital devices at home.

Noon.ch, our institutional partner for Vidya Ratna, sponsored Smart Phones for children. On 25th December, Santa flew in from Switzerland to gift the beautiful red and white boxes to children. These boxes were precisely what Vidya Ratna children were waiting for. There were Mobile Phones in the boxes to help the children follow online lessons imparted by the school.

We began Covid relief work with the families of Vidya Ratna children to ensure that each family had essential food items such as wheat flour, rice, oil, sugar & pulses as per their requirement. During lockdown, we had connected the families with the retail vendor to fetch rations.

COVID-19 Emergency Response

Early March 2020 and 2 billion people of India were pronounced vulnerable to the threat of COVID-19. The nationwide lockdown was enforced with immediate effect. Human lives were restricted at home, on roads and on travel. The people in our communities, being the migrants, were without food and money. Their fragile savings were exhausted and they were forced to borrow for basic sustenance.

Our instant action was to provide rations and food to migrant families stranded in their little dwellings. We provided dry rations, milk, drinking water, protective masks, soaps and hand sanitizers to the community, child homes, government hospitals and Anganwadi centers.

Our work in the community continued with the mission to Feed and protect the women, children and their families from Covid.

Nutrition and Protection Kits

From March 2020 onwards, we had been engaged in Covid Relief work. Our aim was to mitigate the impact of Covid and lockdown crisis for low-income group and migrant community. Our endeavor was to -

- Address hunger crisis and ease distress during the pandemic
- Prevent and protect the vulnerable from contracting the Corona virus
- Nourish and protect children to prevent child wasting
- Provide learning material to children stranded at home due to closure of schools
- Facilitate online learning for children and youth who could not access and afford digital tools
- Restore and organise online lessons for youth for an undisrupted
- Help and support the children from abuse and violence
- Fill Information Gap on issues affecting children, women and youth through online education, webinars and collective talks.

Our Critical Focus Areas:

- **Dry rations & Drinking water**
- **Nourishing & protecting the children**
- **Protecting the Health workers**
- **Livelihood training to youth**
- **Addressing the Digital Gap**
- **Child Protection through Child Line 1098**
- **Educating vulnerable segment of population**

• **Nourishing & Protecting the Vulnerable:**

The children can counter COVID-19 if they are well nourished and protected against Corona virus. A total of 5500 Nutrition and Protection kits (NPKs) were distributed with each Kit carrying the items essential for nourishment and protection from Corona virus. The quality of food items was tested by the Food and Quality Control Department, District Gautam Budh Nagar (Appendix – I).

We reached to over 28000 beneficiaries with food, rations and protection from Corona. These included daily wage laborers, small time vendors, pregnant and lactating women, orphan/deserted children, differently abled people, elderly people, women headed households and migrant workers in Delhi-NCR region including the industrial towns of Noida, Greater Noida and Dadri in U.P. and pockets of Delhi and Gurugram in Haryana. Each Kit provided food for nourishment and items of personal protection from Corona.

Covid Protection for Front Line Health workers:

Worldwide, millions of people stayed at home to minimize the transmission of Corona virus, the severe acute respiratory syndrome. The health-care workers were prepared to do the exact opposite. They were working in clinics and hospitals and risked their lives to save others.

As the pandemic accelerated, the access of personal protective equipment (PPE) to health workers became a key concern. We provided 400 surgical face masks to Doctors and Para medical staff in district Government Hospital, Gautam Budh Nagar, U.P.

- Amid the unprecedented increase in Covid cases in Delhi, we joined hands with SDM office, Model Town, North Delhi to protect the vulnerable from contracting the virus. We distributed face masks among 1000 roadside hawkers, shopkeepers and pedestrians in the busy Azadpur market to prevent the spread of Corona virus.

- Navjeevan Inter College, Bhangel is a higher secondary school from Class VI to XII. It has children coming from underprivileged communities, settled in village Barola and Bhangel. Their families suffered tremendously during the Covid-19 lockdown. The parents, being in the unorganised sector, had lost their livelihood and the families had hand to mouth existence all this while.

- We distributed Nutrition and Protection Kits in the localities of village Mohamamdpur and Jharsa in Gurugram on 29 September 2020. The 6 months long lockdown has taken away the jobs and the family after family was stuck in tiny rented rooms and jhuggis without food and work. With hand to mouth existence, their little savings were exhausted and they had to borrow money from their landlords

Livelihood Training for Youth

In only a few months, the pandemic had disrupted livelihoods for millions of young people worldwide. As per an ILO estimate, more than one in six young people had lost their livelihood due to the pandemic. Education and training opportunities for youth were interrupted, creating long-term implications for post-COVID recovery. The only option for learning was education through Digital platforms which could help them pursue online learning. This gave them an opportunity to engage in E-commerce, and earn an income through online freelancing and micro work.

In February 2020, the new session of Sarthak Program began with 15 youth. When the lockdown was announced in March 2020, the centre has to be closed. We however, improvised ways to stay in touch with the youth. We arranged for virtual classes, making use of Smart mobiles that a few youths had. These classes continued to take place from the home of our Computer Trainer to the homes of our youth. The result was a regular engagement with youth and continuity of their learning experience.

We introduced three kinds of online training courses during the pandemic:

1. **Graphic & Print Design**
2. **Basic Computer Literacy**
3. **Basic Digital Literacy**

We had trained 80 youth in digital literacy and software training through virtual Classes during the lockdown. We partnered with Barclays Finance, Noida for a one-month Mentorship program with youth. Around 25 Sarthak youth were covered under this One-to-One mentorship program that entailed online learning sessions and support by Barclays volunteers.

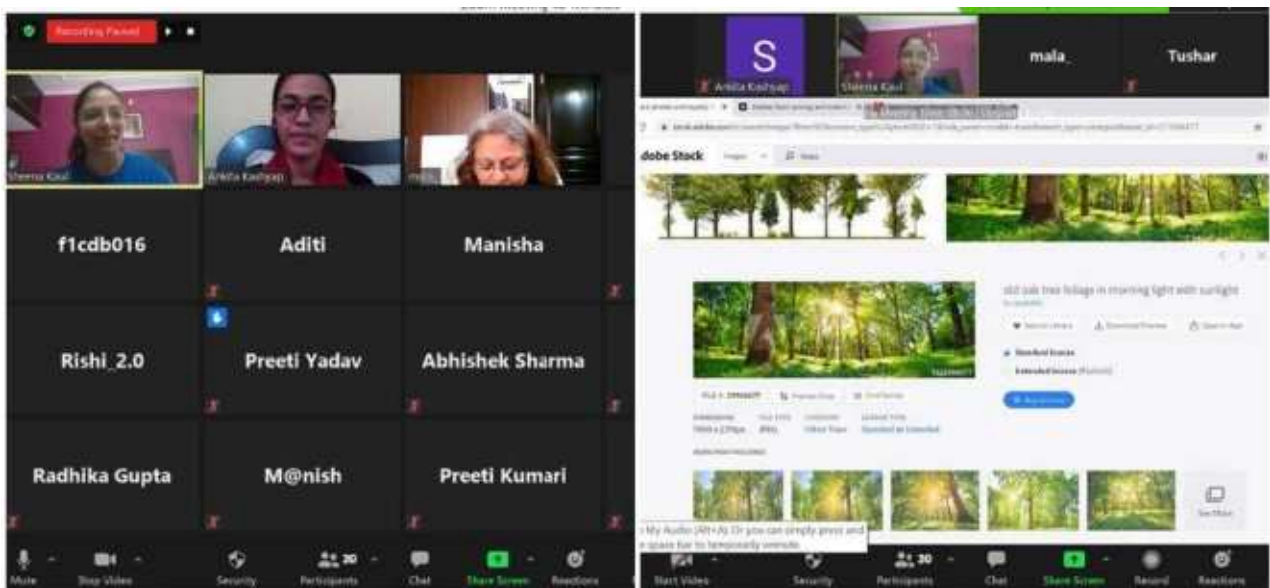

- In September 2020, we completed the 9th Batch of Sarthak course. The youth received the Completion certificates from Ms Anjula Jyala, Board member, SADRAG in an online felicitation ceremony. A total of 25 youth was trained in multiple skills required for a job & for entrepreneurship during the year.

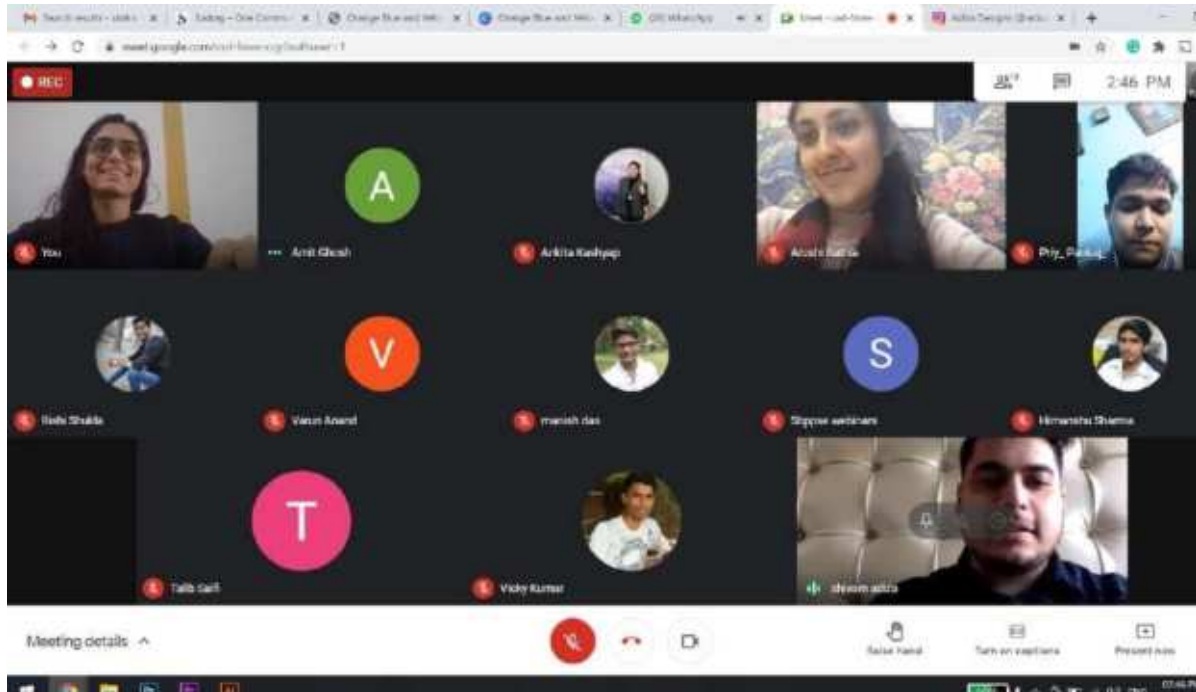


- On 19 September 2020, a special technical session was organized for Sarthak youth. Ms Sheena Kaul, Social Strategist, Adobe India and Board Member, SADRAG interacted with youth and oriented them on Adobe Stock software.



A Session on Digital Creativity

- Mr. Shivam Phukela, CEO, Adiza Designs, conducted a knowledge session on principles of Entrepreneurship. The Sarthak youth learnt the essentials of business ownership such as client management & communication, portfolio making, creative work style and the trajectory of growth in trade & industry. It was a great learning experience with vivid examples based on actual life situations.



Leading Youth towards Entrepreneurship

- Volunteer sessions are the life of Sarthak program. Several corporate volunteers took skill sessions with youth during the year. They conducted training on kinds of Communication, Corporate work culture and work ethics, preparation for Interview, career counselling etc. The volunteers' wisdom and years of experience helped youth to know multiple options available for personal and career growth.

- Camp K12 is the Number One platform for online coding courses for children. It is designed and implemented by a group of MIT/Harvard alumnus. We had partnered with Camp K12 to impart training in the basics of Coding which comprised the crucial programming languages and functional programming. The classes were imparted online.



Coding Career has a great Earning Potential

- Sarthak prepares youth for employment and entrepreneurship development. Therefore, financial knowledge and money management skills are essential components of their training. Ms Vinita Arora, Co-founder, Wealth Wings, a dedicated company that provides financial knowledge and its functions, conducted a series of online sessions with Sarthak youth on money, its genesis and its usefulness for a secured future. The youth learnt modes of money management, savings & investments, financial security and banking operations along with divisions of needs and allocation of money for various purposes.



Financial Literacy is crucial for youth

- Sarthak youth innovated ways to protect their family from Corona. They used cloth lying at home to make masks for their family. They also made safe Hand Sanitizers with Alcohol, Aloe Vera Plant, Coconut Oil, Glycerine, Dettol and Vitamins Capsules. Their efforts saved money as well as protected them from contracting the virus.

• For children in conflict with law

A three months **Life Skills course** from November 2020 to January 2021, was conducted for Children in Conflict with Law at Govt. Observation Home for Boys, Noida. The classes were held online by subject experts and life skills practitioners. The lessons focused on crucial life skills such as Communication, Emotions, career building and handling uncertain situations of life.

On 2 February 2021, the children were given the Completion Certificates by Atul Soni, DPO, GB Nagar. The participants shared their learning experience with all. The ceremony was presided over by Mr Ravi Rawat, General Manager, Moon Beverages Ltd. and Col. Shailendra Singh from the Indian armed forces.

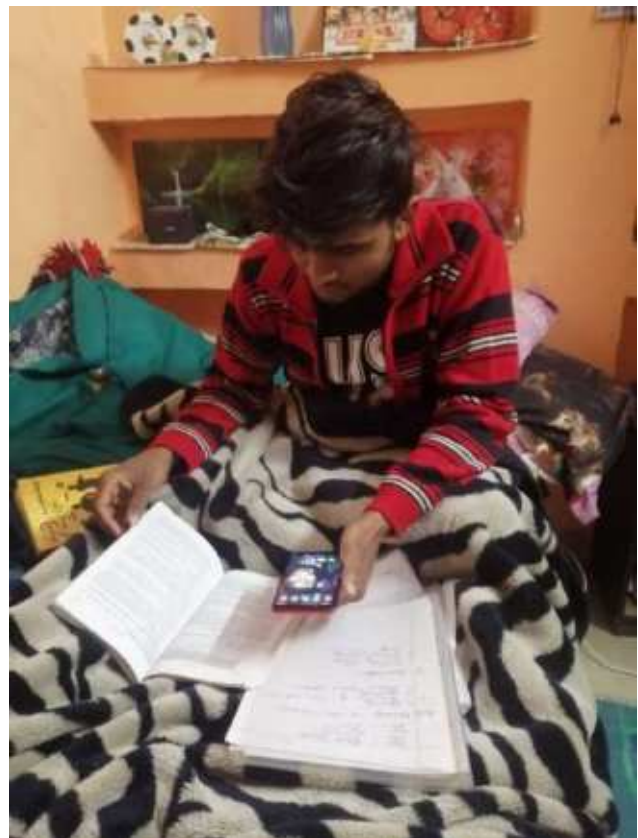
Bridging the Digital Gap

During the pandemic, the New Normal way of life glued us to digital screens, as the only option to stay informed. However, the stark digital divide became a major challenge for children and youth who had no digital resources at home. They struggled with the existing 3As – Accessibility, Availability and Affordability of digital tools. Due to the in-access to digital tools as 3As, they remained outside the realm of online learning.

To address the issue of digital divide, we initiated Digital Bank in partnership with One Teacher One Scientist, the brain child of Vaishali Gupta, an Educationist and a writer. Digital Bank aimed to reduce the existing digital divide so that the children and youth can have an uninterrupted online learning experience. The youth and children were provided the digital tools such as laptop, mobile phone, desktop, printer, camera, I pad or any such tool that is required for online learning.

The specific objectives of Digital Bank were to:

- 1. Mobilize digital devices for underprivileged children & youth**
- 2. Make available the digital devices to children & youth as per their requirement**
- 3. Train children & youth on the online mode of learning**
- 4. Support children for recurring maintenance costs of the digital device**

Digital Bank was formally launched on 15 August 2020. During the year, it has made Online Learning accessible to 50 children and youth from the migrant Communities.

- **Independence of Work for Manish!**

Manish lives with his parents and brother in Shahdara, Delhi. His father worked as a semi-skilled worker in a private company. Manish did the Graphic and Print Design course with us in 2018. Later, he joined a private company as a Graphic Designer. During the lockdown, Manish lost his job because the company was closed. With no offline options available, Manish tried for free-lance online photography. He had to click pictures and convert them into digital designs. However, he needed a digital camera for this kind of work. Tired and jobless, Manish couldn't afford to purchase a camera.

Manish applied for a digital camera in Digital Bank. He received one and he practiced product photography on this camera. Manish is an expert digital photographer now. He is enlisted with Amazon India for free-lance work. He sends them product pictures and is paid for it.

- **Sanju – Our Star!**

While Sanju's father is a driver, his mother is a housewife. His siblings could not study beyond class 8. They work at petty places to earn money. COVID-19 took away the job of Sanju's father. His siblings lost their jobs too. The family was stranded desperately counting the days of deprivation. Sanju suffered. While his school conducted online classes, he was whiling away his time. The family had a shared mobile phone. Sanju could not access it for online learning. We enrolled Sanju in Digital Bank. He received a smart phone to attend the online classes. Our Sanju is happy since he can now independently continue his school studies.

Child Protection

Violence prevention and response services for children were severely disrupted during the COVID-19 pandemic, leaving children at increased risk of violence, exploitation and abuse. Caught amidst the socio-economic fallout of the disease and the all-pervasive sense of uncertainty and anxiety, children faced heightened threats to them

Well-being. There was an enhanced need to prevent abuse, assist children in distress and provide emotional support.

During the year 2020-21, Child Line Greater Noida provided support to around 580 children in distress. The team members worked 24 hours a day to reach out to a child stranded without food, milk and other essentials. The Child Line response was swift despite restrictions on physical movement. We had permission from the district administration for work related travel.

The year 2020 was a challenging year for Child Line. The number of children in need of care and protection from violence was exponentially high over the year. In the initial phase of Covid-19, the lockdown impacted the migrants the most. They were stranded at home with no livelihood and no money to buy food. We addressed around 256 distress calls on Help Line No. 1098 for want of food, rations and milk for the children. Since they had no money to procure fresh milk, they gave little milk diluted with water to their children.

Food was one major worry for the family. We received calls from children to help them with notebooks and other learning material. There were complaints of physical and sexual abuse with children forced to share the little available space with the adult members of the family. Around 48 children were reported missing or lost during the one year of pandemic.

When the lockdown eased, many children had drifted to child labour for the support of their family. The family's inability to sustain the household had impacted the children and they were forced to work in odd jobs. Around 5 young girls were married off due to resource crunch at home.

Besides direct intervention for support to children, we organized several programs for awareness on child protection issues as following -

• **POSHAN Month at Primary School, Tensile Dadri:**

The state govt. observed Poshan Maah in September 2020. We distributed Nutrition and Protection Kits and face masks in village Chithera & village Dujhan in Tehsil Dadri, GB Nagar. On this occasion, Shri S.L. Yathiraj, District Magistrate, GB Nagar, CDO, BDO, Child Development Project Officer, Assistant BSA were present for an interaction with the community and Child Line Greater Noida team. Adnan Usmani, Coordinator, spoke on the working of Child Line in the district and the Covid Relief Work that has been undertaken by the organization.

- **Stop Child Labor Campaign in G B Nagar:**

Together with District Shram Vibhag and AHTU, we ran a No Child Labour campaign in Greater Noida and Dadri. Around eleven children were rescued the stretch between Lakwani Mod to Surajpur- Dadri Road. These children were in the age group 14 to 17 years. They were handed over to their families after proper counselling. The employers of these children paid penalty in violation of Child Labour Act.

- **Empowering Children on Child Protection issues:**

An awareness program was organised at Navjeevan Inter college, Bhangel, Noida on 10 November 2020. The Child Line Greater Noida team informed the children about the functioning of 1098- the 24 hours national Helpline for children. film, Komal, prepared by Child Line India Foundation, was screened during the session. The Child Line pamphlets were also distributed among the children.

• **Child Line Se Dosti Week:**

Child Line Greater Noida organized Child Se Dosti Week with multiple stakeholders from 7 to 14 November 2020. It conducted a Signature Drive on child protection issues at Police HQ, GB Nagar. The police officials signed the oath of child protection during this drive. The Child Line team shared the Safe Noida booklet with Vrinda Shukla, DCP, Women safety, GB Nagar. The booklet is a ready resource on protective legislation, complaint redressal mechanism for women and young girls in the district GB Nagar.

Glimpses over the Year

• Encouraging the Young Covid Warriors:

Pained by the miseries of migrant families, Dorika Poplai, a student of Delhi Public School, Noida mobilized the students of her school for help to children during the Covid. She initiated Unnati, a program to help children learn during the lockdown period.

Dorika's Unnati conducted virtual workshops for Vidya Ratna children. The children had difficulty accessing and following the online sessions organized by their school. The Unnati volunteers took online sessions around the mainstream subjects of Science, Mathematics, English and Social Studies with the objective of solving their problems and enhancing their basic understanding of school subjects. The initial phase of online learning was too tough for children to follow with no support at home. Unnati sparked an interest among the children for school learning once their problems were addressed.

- **Panel discussion on Nutrition for Children:**

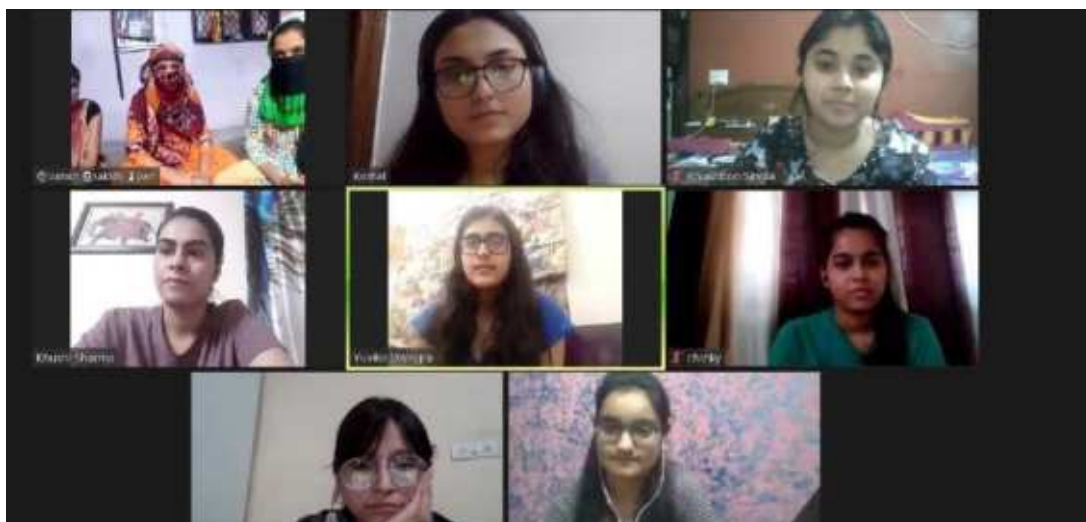

- **Enactus for alternate livelihood to migrant women:**

When the traditional livelihood options closed down during Covid-19, the young Enactus team of Shaheed Rajguru College of Applied Sciences for Women, Delhi University, was exploring innovative ideas for economic sustainability of community women. They conducted an orientation session with community women in village Nagla for the making of cow dung products and their marketing. In the session, the women were provided information on alternate skilling and livelihood options.

End December 2020, our office was flooded with lovely Xmas gifts for children. The volunteers of Jubilant Life Sciences Limited, Noida, had very painstakingly planned the Wish Tree for children and procured the gifts for each one of them. It was a new kind of Christmas where they sent us the gifts through e-commerce portals and we in turn delivered the gifts to every home. Saddened with Covid restrictions, the gifts brought joy to children. They thanked their volunteer friends, the Wish Tree and online Santa for meeting their wishes.

A series of art and crafts workshops were held for children. The artists from the renowned Kiran Nadar Museum of Art took online workshops on different forms of art, crafts and creativity. The children sat around the laptop and followed the crafts trainer. It was collective learning for all.

Training and Knowledge Sharing

- **Advocacy on World Day against Child Labour 2020:**

On The World Day against Child Labour, a District level webinar was organized by Shram Vibhag, District Gautam Buddh Nagar. Using the platform, we highlighted the increase in child labour as a direct result of lost livelihoods and distressed families during Covid-19. We advocated for a stricter monitoring and follow up by district Shram Vibhag to ensure that children are not employed by the local industry. We called for a collaborative effort with institutions, civil society and administration to ensure that no child drops out of school and joins the informal labour force.

Adnan Usmani, Program Manager, Child Protection & Coordinator, Child Line Greater Noida shared ground observations on the situation of child labour in GB Nagar district. The webinar was attended by representatives of district administration, trade unions, activists and several civil society members.

- The Director took an online session with the students of Anthropology Department, Amity University on 17 June 2020. The subject was Post Covid-19: The emerging New Normal in Social Sector & Youth Engagement. It emphasised the role of youth in strengthening the not-for-profit sector in the wake of Covid-19.

- We received several complaints of fake identities and cyber bullying while children attended online classes. We conducted online workshops on Cyber Security for Children on 1 August 2020. It was conducted for the children of Greater Valley School, Greater Noida. Dr Bhandari moderated the technical session delivered by Ms Suja Sukumaran, Sr. Program Manager, Enfold India, Bengaluru. It was attended by 80 children of senior classes and their teachers.

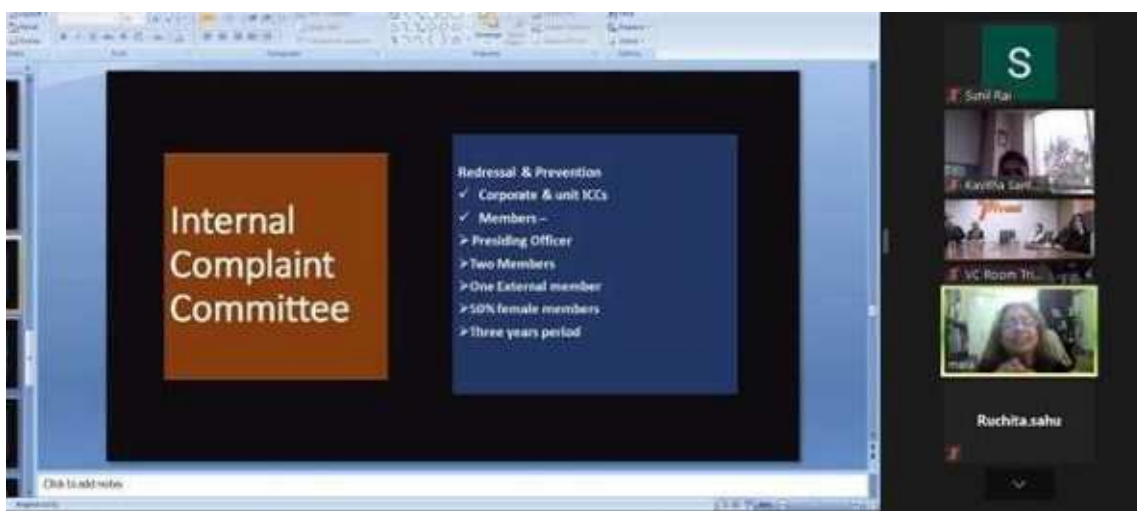

- A Happy Childhood Campaign was launched on 14 October 2020 by Salaam Namaste, the Community Radio & Child Line Greater Noida. It was directly broadcast in Noida and Ghaziabad areas. A series of online talks were conducted under the campaign.

- On 21 November 2020, an online consultation was organised under Happy and Healthy Childhood Campaign with Salaam Namaste Community Radio, Noida. The panellists were Abhishek Pathak, U.P. State Officer, Child Line India Foundation, Anita Rana, Director, Child Line Meerut, medical practitioners, Dr Bhandari and Child Protection Manager, SADRAG. Apart from sharing the grassroots experiences, the panel recommended several action points for robust multi-stakeholder partnerships to ensure happy, healthy and safe childhood.

- An online session on Understanding Gender and its Socio-cultural Implications was conducted by Dr Bhandari on 5 December 2020. The session was held with the students of Engineering, GNIOT Group of Institutions, Greater Noida.

Thematic sessions were held that ranged from basic conceptualisation of Gender & its manifestation to the socio-cultural implications and legal provisions for gender justice.

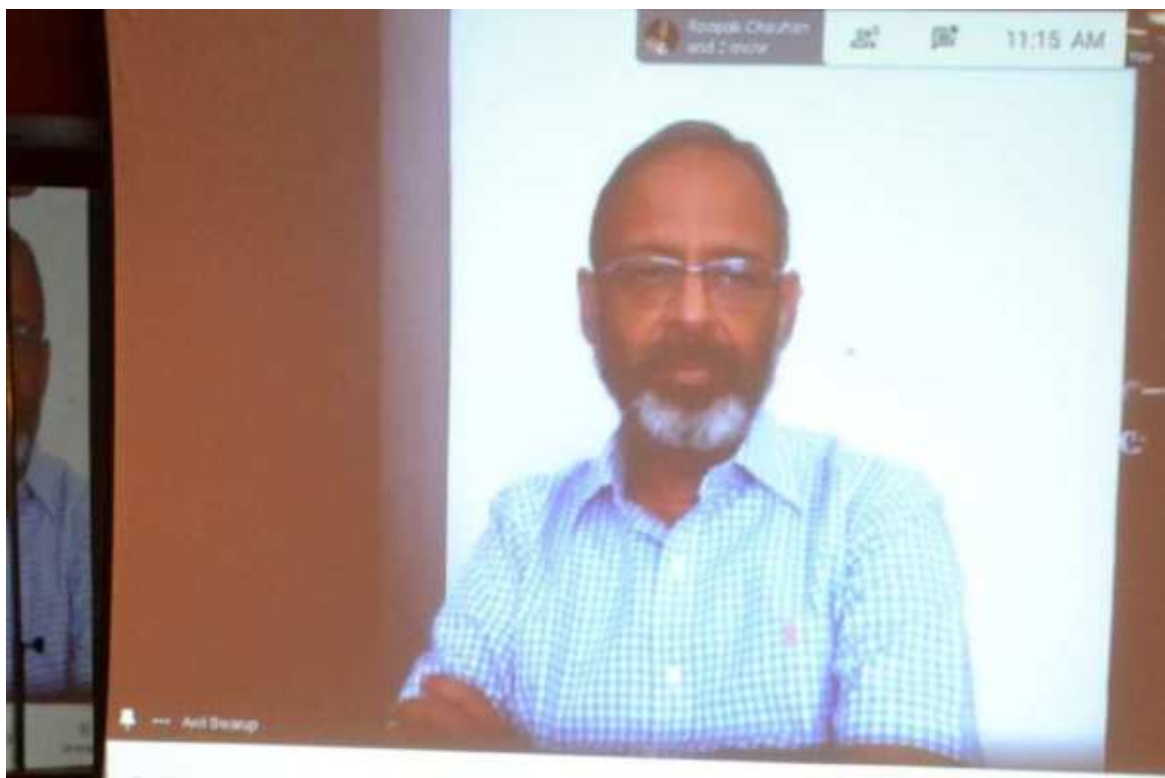

Stories of Hope

During the year, Corona virus continued to spread, with growing number of confirmed cases in India. The vulnerability of street, homeless and migrants increased multifold during the lockdown. They had no private space to isolate and quarantine, if contracted the virus. They're in access to medical care worsened their plight. We reached out to every possible family and individual at this time of crisis.

➤ A Little Hope for Sarita!

In village Nagla, Noida, Sarita lived with her husband and three children. While her husband worked in a neighborhood factory, Sarita worked as a sanitary worker in a private company. The family was happy and the small children had enough to eat.

The catastrophe struck when lockdown was announced and all the economic activity was closed down. Sarita and her husband lost their jobs. They sat huddled with their children in the tiny rented room, waiting for help. They could not go out to help themselves.

Days passed and the situation got acute. While their meagre savings were over, the room rent and basic expenses mounted up. Soon the family had no food at home. In desperation, they called 1098 and Child Line Greater Noida team swiftly responded. She was given dry rations such as rice, wheat flour, pulses, cooking oil, sugar etc. so that she could cook and feed the family.

➤ Reshma didn't Give Up on Life!

Reshma lives with her husband in Surajpur in Greater Noida. They have six children. While Reshma's husband plies cycle rickshaw for livelihood, Reshma looks after the children at home.

Due to pandemic, a strict lockdown was imposed by the central government. Reshma's husband found no people on the streets to be ferried. His income stopped and he stayed at home with no work and zero income. At one moment, they had no money to buy food. They were starving from hunger.

The husband stood in long queues for food at the community kitchens. More than the fear of Covid, it was persistent hunger that disturbed the family day and night.

We reached out to Reshma and gave her the Nutrition & Protection Kit for her family. The Kit had Powder Milk for children, pulses, Daliya, Suji, and Sugar for nutrition. There were face Masks, Dettol soaps and hand Sanitizer for Covid protection.

Reshma's family is now saved from hunger and is protected from Covid.

➤ Chanda: Unsettled from Settled!

Chanda Devi is 29 years old. She lives with her husband and two small children. Her husband is a laborer. The family migrated to Noida on 20 February 2020 in search of work. They were hardly settled with her husband getting some work to do that they came in the grip of Covid-19.

The emergency lockdown took away their peace of mind. Chanda's husband lost the job that he had acquired a few days ago. They were stranded in their rented room. Chanda borrowed some money and food from her room owner that lasted for a few days. Her husband was helpless with no work and no money to buy food and pay the room rent.

We reached out to Chanda and provided her the dry rations kit. It had wheat flour, rice, sugar, cooking oil, semolina and porridge for the nutrition of the family. For Covid protection, the Kit had reusable cotton masks and Dettol soaps.

The Nutrition Kit would benefit my children's health Chanda said as she received the kit.

➤ **Tarana's Journey from Bihar to Noida!**

Tarana is a 28 years old young woman who lives with her husband and three children. Her youngest child is 6 months old. The family migrated from Bihar in February 2020. The purpose was to find work and have an income for the family. Before Tarana's husband could apply and appear for an interview, the pandemic lockdown was announced.

The family was left stranded with the sudden imposition of lockdown. Initially they thought that the lockdown would remain for a few days but it was unprecedentedly extended. Whatever little savings they had, were exhausted soon. They contacted their relatives for money in their native place but they were denied.

When we reached out to Tarana, she came with her small child. She said that she would like to thank us from the bottom of her heart.

➤ **Rajpal: Struggling with Life!**

Rajpal, 55 years, lives in a jhuggi near railway station in Dadri. He lives with his wife and six children in a rented jhuggi for many years. Rajpal earns money through rag-picking in the area. He also begs at the station along with his children.

On the whistle of the approaching train, Rajpal and his older children would rush to the platform. They begged for money and kept it safely in the worn-out cotton bags hanging on their shoulders. At the end of the day, they would count the money and buy food for the family. Due to Covid lockdown, the economic activity had stopped and the train ceased to halt at the station. Rajpal lost his means of earning and the family was left with no food and money. Rajpal was helpless and could not provide the two-times meal to his family.

The Life Kit brought some relief in Rajpal's home. The family had food to be cooked and children didn't go hungry with the hope that Rajpal would soon get back to rag picking and earn some money which would help them get over this bad phase of life.

➤ **Sushma: From Daily Wage to No Wage!**

Sushma and her husband live in slums near Ek Murti in village Bistrakh, Greater Noida. They are daily wage workers and both worked at the construction sites. They have two children. While one is 8 years old, the other is 2 years old. The family was happy in their tented makeshift hut before the lockdown.

When the lockdown was announced, the construction activity had completely stopped. Overnight, Sushma and her husband lost their regular work. They were stranded in their makeshift shanty without work and money. It was a challenge to survive during those times. As the lockdown eased, Sushma's husband looked for work. He got some work but it was neither regular nor enough in amount. We met Sushma in her jhuggi and gave her Life Kit that comprised items of dry ration and protection from Covid.

Life Kit was like a savior in the difficult times of Sushma and her family.

➤ **Fatima with a Tiny Smile!**

Fatima lives in the slums of Sector-8 Noida, Gautam Buddha Nagar, Uttar Pradesh with her 1-year-old daughter. She is living in a rented jhuggi. After some days of marriage, Fatima met with a road accident which crippled her from waist downwards. While Fatima was recovering from the shock and agony of the accident, her husband left her for good. Fatima was left to fend for herself. She was pregnant at that time and had no money.

Child labour cases went up during lockdown in Noida

Noida: Eleven-year-old Dhewra (name changed) had to drop out of school four years ago to take care of his siblings—now aged six and four years. His father, an e-rickshaw driver, and mother, who works at home, work hard so that the family can have two square meals.

When the lockdown came into force in March, Dhewra's father couldn't take his vehicle out and the Sector 106 society where his mother worked closed its doors to domestic staff. The young boy, who never had a normal childhood, has had to start selling vegetables to try and plug the income void.

This is the plight of not just Dhewra but several others like him. Childline India officials said that they have received around 17 calls related to children taking up jobs in Noida, Dankaur and Greater Noida between March and June.

Satya Prakash, manager of PNB India Suraksha that takes care of the helpline in Noida, told TOI that nine such calls were received in March, while two calls were received in May and six in June.

"Prior to the lockdown, one or two such cases were reported but now we are receiving calls in bulk," he said. Dhewra's mother said letting him sell vegetables was the family's last resort. "He had scored 80% in his Class II exam and wanted to study further. But if he went

to school, who would have taken care of his siblings? Also, with the lockdown, I lost my cooking job that would fetch me Rs 12,000," she said, adding they are yet to pay rent for June and July. The boy has been selling vegetables in Halpura area but his mother has stopped him from working now as there weren't enough earnings.

On June 15, TOI had reported about another 13-year-old boy who was forced to sell fruits during lockdown.

In a similar case, hunger pangs forced an eight-year-old boy to drop out from the government school that he was studying in and take up shoe polishing. The boy was later rescued by Childline officials from Greater Noida's Kansa area and his parents were also counselled. His parents had said that since they ran out of money after losing jobs, the boy was asked to earn.

In yet another incident, a 14-year-old boy from Faridabad was sent to Tagpur in Greater Noida before the lockdown to stay with his sister.

However, the minor boy's brother-in-law made him work in his photo studio for months. When Childline got to know of the incident, they intervened and the boy was produced before the child welfare committee and sent to his home in Faridabad.

Meeta Bhandari, president of NGO Sadrag, which handles Childline's Greater Noida helpline, said, "Unfortunately, there has been an increase in the number of calls received pertaining to child labour during the lockdown months. There have also been cases in which parents have asked their children to work as they couldn't earn anything." The lockdown, she added, has been a testing time for all.

Just one smartphone at home, girl sacrifices studies for sister

Noida: Arti Shah, 16, had dreams of becoming a karate player. In 2018, she trained for a year at a private school in the neighbourhood and achieved the green belt. But as the lessons, which cost Rs 400 per month, became too expensive for her family, she gave up on her dreams and focused on studies, not knowing that the pandemic would seize that from her as well.

Arti lives in a shanty in Nithari with her family of eight, and an NGO called Sadrag had helped her get admission to the Noida Public School, where she was studying in Class III. But as the pandemic struck and the classes went online, she and her younger sister had to decide who gets to use the only smartphone in the family to follow the lectures, since both their classes start at 9 am.

"With only one smartphone in the house, the girls used to fight over the phone. We use small handsets using which they cannot attend online classes," Arti's mother, Budhni Shah, said.

The lockdown has been disastrous for the family. Arti's father, Anil Shah, who runs a small general store, was forced out of business as most of the residents in the area, who were migrant workers, went back home.

He now makes only Rs. 50-100 a day, barely enough to feed the large family.

"For the last 15 days, the store is shut. I only sell packets of guthka now since I don't have money to purchase essential items to sell," he said.

One of the elder sisters who used to work with an NGO as a teacher and earn Rs 10,000 a month, also lost her job as the project had to be discontinued due to lack of funds.

In the circumstances, buying a smartphone so that Arti can attend classes is beyond their means. "We can't even buy vegetables with what I am earning at present," he said.

On top of this, there is the burden of paying rents for the shop and their house, which cost Rs 5,000 and Rs 2,000 per month, and which

they have not been able to pay for the last two months.

The family says they depend on ration from the government. But although all of them are mentioned in the ration card, they get supply for only two members whose names made it to the ration dealer's system.

"We went to the ration dealer in Nithari and the Noida Authority office multiple times last year to get this error corrected but failed to get it done," Budhni said.

While Arti's classes have begun, she does not have any of the books that were necessary for the Humanities curriculum this year.

"I wanted to go for karate championships but that would also cost money. Now, I want to prepare for the UPSC exam to get a government job," Arti told TOI.

Mother ill, brother jobless, boy quits studies to sell fruits

Noida: Around 8am, when others in his class groggily turn on their computer screens to begin the day's online session, 13-year-old Kanhaiya is two hours into his work for the day. He has five more hours ahead of him, pushing a fruit cart so he can meet the family's expenses. When customers haggle, he lets it slide. He wants to get done, get home and get some sleep.

Two years ago, a local NGO got Kanhaiya enrolled at a private school in Noida after his father, a rickshaw-puller, died of a heart attack. His mother, Meena, was a masseuse for geriatric patients. His brother, an auto driver. When the lockdown began, his mother got too sick to work and his

brother, Raman (25), had no job. So in April, Kanhaiya had to take over.

"We bought the cart with Rs 1,000 borrowed from a neighbour. My elder brother steps out before dawn to buy fruits from the mandi. After he gets back, he gets some sleep and I leave home with the cart. I start around 8am, taking my cart to sectors 25, 26, 30 and 31. By 1pm, it gets too hot and I get back to sleep for a few hours," Kanhaiya said.

Home is a single room at Nithari village in Sector 31, where five of them live — Meena, Raman, his wife, their year-old son and Kanhaiya. With money drying up, they have not been able to pay the Rs 3,000 rent they owe for the past three months.

Class 6 boy calls NGO, says sexually assaulted by senior

THE CASE SO FAR

► Class 6 boy informs his parents in Sept 2018 that a Class 12 student, living in the same society, had been molesting him for 3 years at his house.

► Families discuss matter, teen & his parents move to another society, matter is considered resolved.

► Boy continues to be depressed.

► Encouraged by his sisters, he calls up Childline to complain against the school senior.

► Childline informs child welfare committee.

► FIR is lodged against the senior student; he is later sent to a juvenile correction home.

Makha Bhandari, president of Noida-based NGO Saksham, which handles Greater Noida Childline, told TOI the boys were neighbours, living in the same society in Greater Noida and travelling in the same bus to school. "He (the 13-year-old) discussed the issue with his sisters,

When he told them that he wanted to call up Childline, they encouraged him," Bhandari said.

After listening to his account, Childline informed the child welfare committee, which took cognisance and directed officials to counsel the boy. "He was counselled

twice and officials spoke to his parents too. They said the boy had been upset and wasn't behaving normally," added Bhandari.

After Childline intervened and the parents were taken to board, police were informed. An FIR was lodged under IPC section 377 and sections of the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, said additional DCP (Greater Noida) Vishal Pandey.

According to the FIR, when they were living in the same society, the senior student would call the younger boy repeatedly to his house, where he stripped him and assaulted him sexually. The FIR also mentions that the boy was in depression ever since because of the trauma he went through.

Cops to help minor rape survivors

Noida: The district police have decided to launch an initiative to help minor rape survivors through counselling and rehabilitation. Under the initiative, titled 'Sakshi', trained women police personnel (counsellors) will soon identify minor rape survivors in the city and visit them at their homes in Noida and Greater Noida to counsel them and help them overcome the trauma.

Vrinda Shukla, DCP, Women Safety, Gautam Buddha Nagar, said rape is a serious crime which needs to be checked. "We have formed a special team of 20 women police personnel — 15 sub-inspectors and five head constables. These sub-inspectors are also the investigating officials (IO) in most of the rape cases. For Saturday, we have scheduled a day-long training programme for these personnel. We have invited doctors and psychiatrists from government and private sectors to provide training and sensitise them. The personnel will be trained on how to talk to the survivors and counsel them properly," Shukla said.

She said rape affects survivors mentally. "The police will also help victims who would need medical treatment, psychiatrists or proper medication," she said. Initially police will focus on minor survivors; the initiative would cover older survivors

later. Teams will analyse cases registered in August and September to select cases.

Police said they are figuring out the total number of rape cases registered this year. Shukla said there are also some instances where fake charges of rape were levelled by complainants. "Probe in some cases revealed that allegations were not correct. We will screen complaints and address only serious cases under this initiative," she said. The counsellors will visit the survivors' homes from Monday.

Makha Bhandari, founder of Noida-based women's rights non-government organisation SADRAG, said survivors need to be counselled with sympathy and empathy. "Police should also engage some expert counsellors for this initiative," she said.

Satyam Prakash, programme manager of FBI India Saksham — Childline, an NGO that works for child rights, said that counselling is a must in such cases. "Most police personnel are not specially trained to deal with rape survivors. We have found that the survivors experience mental suffering in such cases. There were some instances where the survivors tried to hurt themselves. The Sakshi initiative should not be limited to counselling only. The police should also ensure counselling of victims' families, ensure compensation, and medical health services, etc. to the victim in an integrated programme," he said.

The family is from Begusarai in Bihar. So they don't have a ration card. "We didn't get the relief for migrant workers we heard the government had promised. Free grains for two months, we were told. But we didn't get any," said Meena. "An NGO helped us and another time we came from Sector 31 bought a ration card. That was it."

After her husband died, Meena had been trying to take on more household

work. "I would make about Rs 60 for each session. Money would be inconsistent, depending on how many calls I'd get. But we managed. That stopped in January," she said. That was when the stomach ache the 13-year-old had got worse. She would struggle to breathe, push through fatigue. Sometimes, it would get more serious — she'd lose consciousness. If she couldn't walk.

Continuing with work was no longer an option. Raman had been driving a rented auto to transport accom-

pany for the past two to three years. "But that also stopped with the lockdown. People were not going out. The rent for the auto, Rs 50 a month, also kept adding up," she said. When the lockdown was relaxed, another this month, Raman tried driving his auto again for a few days but did not get two many customers. He gave up.

In April, they had decided they would have to fall back on something else. This was around the time Kanhaiya's online classes had just resumed. On a tiny phone

screen, he would join in every morning. But he had to stop.

"My friends told me it will be difficult to catch up. I am missing out on a lot. The school is shut on Tuesday, so I try to cover as much ground as possible in that one day. It's not enough. But I don't want to drop out," Kanhaiya said.

Meena is concerned as well. "His very diligent but I don't know what to do. I don't even have money for treatment or medicine," she said. "I only have to return to Begusarai."

Our daughter was gang-raped, says girl's family

The Lakhimpur girl's family said that she had left home to fill up a scholarship form in a neighbouring town.

Although the medical reports of the Noida girl are awaited, doctors treating her suspect more than one person may have raped her. The girl's parents, who stay in a slum near Ecotech 3, said the accused dragged the girl to a field 5km away and raped her. They too, alleged that their daughter had been gang-raped. The girl, according to her parents, was bleeding from her private parts and her clothes were torn when she returned home after an hour. The girl's father informed police. The cops took the girl to the District Hospital.

Dr VB Dhaka, chief medical superintendent of the hospital, confirmed that the girl

had been admitted there. Another doctor treating her said she was critical and had undergone stitches for her injuries. There were reports that the police had detained several people in connection with the alleged rape. However, DCP (women's safety) Vrinda Shukla claimed the only person who had raped the girl had been arrested. "When we received information, teams were formed immediately and the accused was arrested."

He is a 21-year-old man and works as a mason," she added. Shukla said an FIR had been lodged against the accused under IPC Section 376 (rape) and Section 7/8 of the PoCSO Act.

Mala Bhandari, president of Sadrag, which runs Childline in Greater Noida, said a team had met the girl's family who had informed them that the doctors were planning to refer her to an advanced facility in Meerut.

Deep in debt, father tries to get minor girls married off in lockdown

Noida: A high debt, jobless income and COVID health concerns a daily wage labourer in Noida tried to get his two minor daughters married off, claiming he would not want to spend money for arranging a feast for guests at the wedding.

However, before the wedding could take place, a neighbour informed Childline and the officials intervened to stop the event. Officials said the bridegroom had been 25, when the 12-year-old bride was from a Greater Noida village (which it would be prudent to get two deaths — April 18 and 19 — recorded when restrictions on attendance are in place).

The labourer's depicting features were a cause for concern. Not only had the lockdown removed his job, but he was also in a state of financial distress. He had been working as a daily wage labourer in a brick kiln and had lost his job due to the lockdown.

He is the father of two girls, they said they wanted to marry their daughters but their parents had forced their marriage. Their mother said they were helpless. The bride had a disease that was causing her to bleed and the family had debts to repay, a Childline official said.

CHILDLINE OFFICIAL SAYS

When we spoke to the girls, they said they wanted to study but their parents had forced their marriage.

The officials requested the family and the girls' father gave an undertaking to police that he would not get his daughters married off before they turn 18.

The girls are students of classes VI and IX and have been studying at home in their government school since lockdown.

In another case, a family in Greater Noida's Sudhansu village tried to marry off

their 13-year-old son apparently to get a daughter-in-law who could help with domestic chores.

The family of the boy said Childline they wanted their youngest son to get married because his mother had developed a problem in the leg and could not do most of her work.

"The family is very poor and the mother is unable to work due to a problem in the leg. Both the families were ready and the wedding was to take place on March 22. Just a day earlier, we had informed about the marriage and the wedding was called off," an official said.

Child marriages on rise

Several cases of child marriage have been reported in Noida and Greater Noida between March and June. Most of these cases were related to families who have lost livelihoods due to the lockdown.

According to data received from Childline, while two cases of child marriage

were reported in March, there were none in April and May. In June, five cases were reported, which is more than usual. Earlier, one or two cases would be reported in a month of two months. Rising debts due to the lockdown is resulting in parents taking such decisions," said Mala Bhandari, president of an NGO Sadrag, which operates Childline's Greater Noida helpline.

Childline officials said they had also put pressure on the district court to ensure that child marriages between April 2018 and February 2020. However, between March and June this year, they have prevented 10 marriages, three from Greater Noida, one from Lucknow and three from Noida.

Dr. Prakash, manager of PNB-Laxmi Bank, which handles Childline's bank account, expressed concern at the rising number of cases. He said the bank was planning to provide the minimum amount of girls' marriage as from April 2020.

"We have that in most of the cases, including debts due to the lockdown have been forcing parents to think of getting their children, especially girls, married off. Interestingly, we have also reported that in April and May, mostly because of the high price of rice and oil, and not getting of even a few people being married. But, from June, cases have started," he said.

To ensure that cases of child marriage do not rise, a Childline team has been working with the police on families who had tried to marry off their daughters and ensure that children are protected.

Girl 'abducted, raped for days' by 2 youths

Greater Noida: A 16-year-old girl was allegedly kidnapped and raped for days by two youths in Dadri area on Thursday. The family members of the girl alleged the girl along with her younger sister had gone to the forest area near their rented home on January 31, when one of the accused abducted her after thrashing her younger sister. The accused took her to a room in Greater Noida, where another youth had been waiting there. They together raped the girl for days, according to the girl's family.

As the family members failed to trace the girl, they lodged a complaint with the police, following which an FIR under IPC section 363 (punishment for kidnapping) was filed. While the police are claiming the girl had eloped with the youth, the girl said in her statement to the Childline that she was raped for days.

Mala Bhandari, president of Noida-based NGO Sadrag which handles Greater Noida Childline, told TOI that the in-

cident happened in Ajayapuri police station area where the girl stays in a small room with her family while the accused stays in a room opposite to that.

"She had gone to relieve herself with younger sister. The youth had been waiting for her on a bike for some time. He allegedly drove her towards Greater Noida where another youth had been waiting. They confined her in a room for days and allegedly raped the girl," she said.

Dadri SHO Rajvir Singh Chauhan said the girl was traced to Rampur Fatehpur village on Saturday.

"Sections of rape and POCSO Act could be added to the case, which depends on the girl's statement before the magistrate under CrPc section 164," he said.

The family members alleged that a woman constable demanded Rs. 1000 from them for getting the medical examination of the girl done. When contacted, ACP Nitin Singh told TOI that if a complaint is filed by the family, an inquiry will be conducted and action will be taken against the police officer.

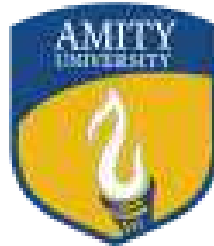
